

#### How macroeconomic stability reflects on food security in West and Central Africa?

The agricultural sector, and more broadly, food systems - encompassing the entire range of actors and their interlinked value-adding activities involved in the production, aggregation, processing, distribution, consumption, and disposal of food products that originate from agriculture, forestry or fisheries, and parts of the broader economic, societal and natural environments in which they are embedded – play a key role in West and Central African economies. Agriculture in particular remains an engine of growth and improved food and nutrition security in Africa (AU, 2015). It employs roughly 60 percent of the population and accounts for approximately 17 percent of Sub-Saharan Africa's grodomestic product (GDP) and 52 percent of its total employment. The sector represents on average 22.2 percent of the West Africa's GDP<sup>2</sup> while being the main contributor for some countries like Niger (40 percent of the GDP)

Despite this important role, the agricultural sector in West and Central Africa faces multiple constraints that hinder its potential to reduce food insecurity and poverty. Food security is a multi-faceted issue, and in a challenging context where governments are facing high budget deficits, restricted fiscal space and high debt, it is imperative that evidence-based policies aimed at achieving food security are implemented. Therefore, we attempt to understand how macroeconomic policy decisions affect food security in West and Central Africa

#### 2. What are the key drivers of food insecurity in West and Central Africa?

Despite considerable efforts by governments, development and humanitarian actors, food insecurity continues to worsen in West and Central Africa. Acute hunger in West and Central Africa is mainly driven by conflict, the climate crisis and macroeconomic challenges. According to the global report on food crises published in 2023, in 2022-2023 period, approximately 35 million people faced high levels of acute food insecurity in Burkina Faso, Cameroon, Chad, Mali, Niger and Nigeria (FAO, 2023). That is mainly due to the persistence of regional security crises in border areas. The impacts of climate change on food availability remain a concern, especially in fragile states. In the past year, localized erratic rains, floods and cumulative rainfall deficits affected crops and pastoral conditions in countries such as Chad, Niger and Nigeria. Regarding the macroeconomic challenges, West and Central Africa has one of th world's most volatile economic growth rates. This is partly due to its economic growth being heavily

# OPERATIONNALIZATION/ TECHNICAL SUPPORT TO COUNTRIES ❖ Acceleration of the implementation of NS-AfCFTA

- Development and implementation of a strategy to promote trade in services (Guinea);
- Capacity-building for entrepreneurs, in general, and exporters, in particular, through the provision of a handbook for the exporters of Guinea-Bissau;
- Development of a digital platform aimed at facilitating the exporting of goods by Nigerian women and young entrepreneurs;
- Awareness-raising among businesses in Senegal of the processes involved in ensuring compliance with trade facilitation measures (rules of origin, and strengthening of the institutional framework...);
- Development of a plan for funding the NS-AfCFTA in the Gambia (support the process of eliminating tariffs, mitigate any negative effects on the country's tax revenues);
- Development of NS-AfCFTA for Cabo Verde;
- Support to women and young entrepreneurs registered on the WABLP which hosted 2 virtual roundtables on 9 July & 23 October 2024 respectively bringing together 14 sector champions, who are trailblazers in the circular economy, and 157 women and young entrepreneurs (products in the circular economy, agricultural including organic fertilizer, waste management, textile and leather, eco-friendly clothing and accessories, sustainable footwear).

#### OPERATIONNALIZATION/ TECHNICAL SUPPORT TO COUNTRIES

#### **Strengthening countries' development planning and macroeconomic policies**

- Supported a round table for donors, organized by the Government of Guinea to help to raise funds for the implementation of the country's Interim Reference Programme, 2022–2025, -Dubai, United Arab Emirates, in February 2024.
- The joint deployment of the IPRT (planning and reporting toolkit), in partnership with the MGD & SRO-CA following in-depth consultations and the drafting of the relevant ToRs of a 1rst training session held in July 2024, for Portuguese-speaking countries, including Cabo Verde and Guinea-Bissau;
- Completion of the deployment of IPRT in Benin, and training held in September 2024, to enhance assessment of the country's progress on SDGs.
- In July 2024, facilitated discussions on synergies with other WAMA.
- Support to Liberia, by deploying a Chief Technical Advisor to the Ministry of Finance, in support of the formulation of the National Development Plan (NDP), its macroeconomic framework, among others. Liberia's NDP is under development, with the OIBC actively participating in the process.
- In collaboration with MGD and ACS, The Gambia is being supported on the formulation of its Long-Term Vision 2050.
- Technical assistance to the organisation of the 8th Ghana International Trade and Finance Conference, a High-Level Continental Policy Dialogue on "Global Debt Initiative and Africa's Credit Ratings" held in 6 September 2024, to foster consensus around a Ghana-led coalition advocating for sustainable debt treatment.

#### Country testimonials

**Burkina Faso**: representative of the country's Transitional Legislative Assembly said that "members of the Assembly could appreciate the suitability of the budgeting approach that is responsive to the demographic dividend. She said that such an approach would contribute to combating unemployment and to control the birth rate, with a view to reducing poverty and economic and social dependence. She pledged to work towards budgetary discipline for the benefit of Burkina Faso."

**Niger**: According to the Ministry of the Economy and Finance of the Niger, "Budgeting that is responsive to the demographic dividend would enable the country to capitalize on these investments with socioeconomic benefits and the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals, in line with pillar two of the Resilience Programme for the Safeguarding of the Homeland: inclusive development of human capital."

### **2025 Work Program**

- Provide ongoing support to Members of Parliament from five Member States on population dynamics, social demands, and the optimal allocation of public resources to capitalize on the demographic dividend.
- Empower countries to take ownership of the mechanism to monitor and report on progress in the implementation of the African Union Road map on harnessing the demographic dividend, thereby strengthening their ability to monitor, report on, and align their National Development Plans (NDPs) with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the African Union Agenda 2063.
- Utilize advanced macro-models to bolster capacities in macroeconomic policy analysis and forecasting
